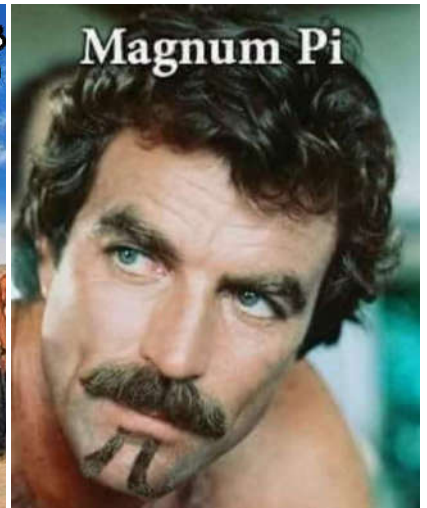
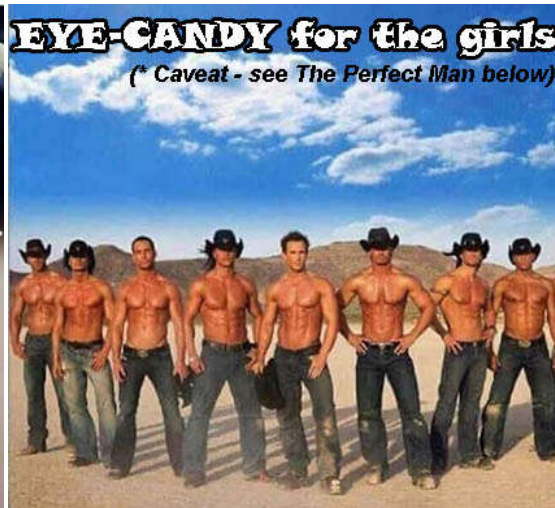

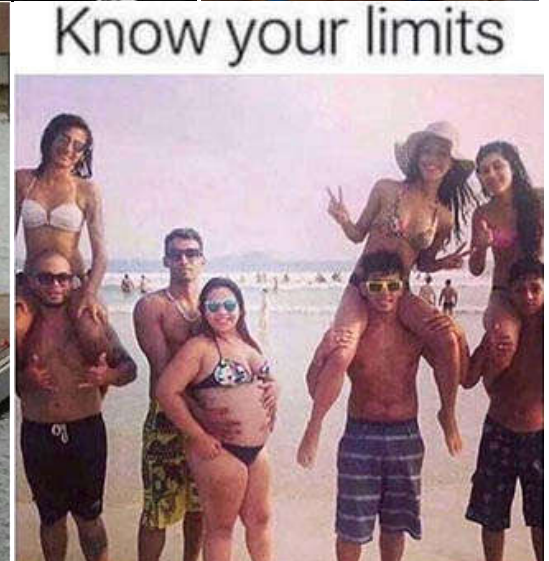

April F-f-f-foolin'

Breaking Exclusive after we were sent leaked documents on 31/03/21. Brighton and Hove City Council are planning to charge a fee to use the main city beach this summer including the UK's first Night Time party Zone.

The trial will see turnstiles put in at access points between the 2 piers. This idea has hailed from Turkey Istanbul's Kadıköy beach where this has been in operation for a number of years. The idea behind this is to make the main beach an exclusive clean safe place for people to enjoy. The money charged will give you the provision of a deck chair and parasol for the day, Lifeguard beach cover, free tap drinking water and a premium bin and beach cleaning service as well as a phone app to order drinks and food to your deckchairs from a number of the bars/food outlets. Bag checks will take place at the turnstiles and no pre brought food or drink will be allowed.



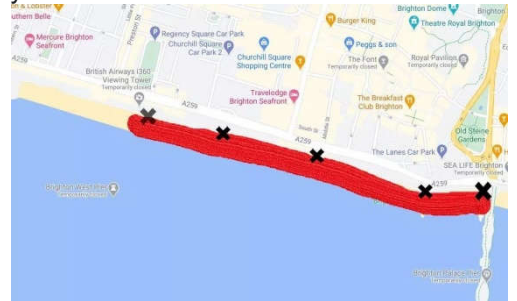
The document said a charge of £20 a day for non BN Residents reduced to £15 if you can provide proof you live in the BN 1,2 or 3 post code areas with discounts for children and families. The charge will be in from 7am till 7pm when the gates will then be taken over to make the party Zone. The plan is then to then charge one fee for access all areas for the evening making this one of the biggest party zones in Europe with space for 2000 party goers with the option to increase to 3000 when lock down rules are completely eased. ID and bag checks will take place and drug dogs will be by the entrances and a full night-time security will be provided including trained lifeguards and a first aid area. At 5am at weekends and 2am weekdays the area will be closed and cleared and

specialist cleaning team will clean the area. Mid week the beach can be used to host outdoor cinema events and live bands. Tickets will be purchased through a new app where a QR code will be issued.

We approached the council for comment yesterday afternoon on hearing of this news and a spokesperson said "with the demand of locals to provide better service to each users," adding there were other beaches in Brighton which were still free of charge. "The turnstiles will be placed to provide people better services as well as to prevent illicit access to the beach,"

We asked a local bar owner and they said "I think the fee is too high for beach entry in the day, but at night will be the new Malaga during the summer months. One entry fee and access to 6 nightclubs plus bars and restaurants in a safe environment, it's going to be big and hopefully v

The plans will be going in front of an emergency council meeting next week and are expected to be approved, the turnstiles are expected to be installed by May half term break. Awaiting full statement later today.



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BREAKING: Sussex Sceať set for Return!

Change is literally on the way following the UK Government's announcement this morning that, well over a millennium since its decline, the 'Sceat' currency is set to make a spectacular comeback in Sussex!

As a part of regional devolution plans and a local economy drive, the ‘Sceat’ will once again circulate Sussex from 1st September 2021, the Ministry for Housing, Communities and Local Government has announced. The Sceat was the primary currency of many Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, including the Kingdom of Sussex, during the late 7th and early 8th centuries and will now return as a modern currency after over 1200 years. The Sussex Sceat will be reintroduced simultaneously with the return of the ‘Thrymsa’ to Dorset, Hampshire and Somerset, and the ‘Essaxon Sceat’ to Essex, Middlesex and Hertfordshire in the newly established E.E.C. (The Essex Economic Community).

Government sources had rumoured that the Old Mint House in Pevensey was to be reopened in order to produce the new currency which stopped the production of coins in 1154, however a survey of the site concluded that the property was not adequate to host modern equipment, so a state of the art money-making facility is to be built at Newpound Common this Spring, with a Bank of Sussex building being established in Lewes during the Summer. Sites at Billingshurst, Pound Hill and Boodle Street Green had also been proposed.

The image of the brand new \$20 note has also been released this morning; bearing King Ælle, the first king of Sussex, on the obverse and local writer and historian Hilaire Belloc on the reverse. The \$5 note will feature novelist and poet Rudyard Kipling, the \$10 note will display writer Virginia Woolf and the \$50 note will be embellished with an image of composer and songwriter William Ward-Higgs. The new coinage system has also been publicised with the Sussex Sceaet set to be the world's first ever heximalised currency; there will be six 'Martlets' to the Sceaet. When the Sceaet is rolled out in September, it will begin with an exchange of 1 SXS to 1 GBP but is expected to fluctuate with many leading economists predicting the Sussex Sceaet will become a stronger currency to the Pound Sterling, especially as exports of Gypsum and Sussex Marble are set to rise in the winter.

The launch of this new currency has been welcomed locally and it is hoped that it will lead to a much needed boost to the county's economy. The announcement has been especially praised by lecturer of Economics and Finance at the University of Burwash, Dr John Radinden, who stated this morning; "Dem Sceats es a gurt druv fur dee lokel 'conomy, I cen tek dese 'ere Sceats dun dee pub somewhen, 'n get a point of 'arveys, wid dee ful convedunce da' dey wunt ful in dee purse o' a Man o' Kent! Perfick!" Full details will be published by the Bank of Sussex next week.



REHASHING

Findon Valley & Cissbury ring – Although a relatively recent member of our little tribe, NickO is a highly experienced hasher and member of the international 1000 club having completed over 1000 runs with Kirton H3 alone before his move into our area. He's also a very experienced Orienteer which explains the 'interesting' nature of his hashes, that always seem to take us on a Yardbirds tour of Over Under Sideways Down in wherever the run area happens to be. Plan A was to start near the Steepdown car park but hare ultimately decided there wouldn't be enough room, so we shifted to Storrington Rise. Some stunning sunsets on the hash lately made this seem a great option for catching the rays as late as possible. The hare was almost



lamenting that this was going to be a bit more normal hash due to a couple of long trails needed to get us in touch with the ring itself, which may have had something to do with his suggested tagline for the hash of 'round and round they go', but it didn't take long before we were pedalling and recycling bits we'd already covered which is all part of the fun. We were in fact zig-zagging ever upwards! Hitting the main earthwork trail we reached the far eastern breach where we completed the climb to the trig point only to find an X on-back to check. We continued on the undulating track well below the Ring to an 18 way check with the actual route being back up to the top past the wild ponies, although the Crawley lot chose to go way too far down the hill before realising their

error! Not sure they cared much (*with the possible exception of Little Swinger who's knees bore the tan line of the South Downs 50 on Saturday!*) as they'd had so much fun recreating the Lion King in front of the setting sun! It was a somewhat sharper descent but the sight of the car park did not necessarily mean we were on inn, although several pods did short-cut across the square.



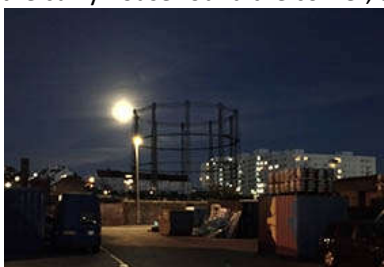
